As of April 1, 2021, the community of Clyde River requires that all researchers interested in applying for a Nunavut research license to the community first complete a letter of intent (LOI). This process ensures that potential research applications align with community priorities, interests, and needs, and creates a more efficient and effective system for applications and review.

Please complete the following template. Add extra space as needed. The template must be <u>completed in both Inuktitut and English</u> and submitted to <u>ittaq@ilisaqsivik.ca</u>. Ittaq, with the support of the Hamlet Council and Nammautaq HTO, coordinates the review of LOIs, as well as research license applications to Clyde River. LOIs are reviewed monthly; allow up to 4 weeks for review.

If approved, applicants will be invited to submit a full research license application as required through the Nunavut Research Institute (NRI) https://www.nri.nu.ca/research-licensing-applications. Invitation to submit an NRI application does not guarantee license approval.
